Initially I always wanted to become a teacher but when I applied to universities I was declined. Although I had the UCAS points required to get in, I lacked experience of working with children.

Speaking to a career advisor, I was offered a one year course at Bradford College in childcare; this would provide me with some experience at a primary school and a nursery setting. This seemed like the perfect plan as I could use this childcare course as a stepping stone for me to get in to university.
